




WOMEN AT THE BALLOT BOX




THE 19TH AMENDMENT, GRANTING WOMEN THE **RIGHT TO VOTE, WAS RATIFIED ON AUGUST 18, 1920. NEW HAMPSHIRE WOMEN CONSISTENTLY VOTE** IN HIGHER NUMBERS THAN MEN, YET ARE FAR FROM ACHIEVING POLITICAL PARITY.

When it comes to voting, the gender gap in politics is reversed. Over three-quarters of New Hampshire women are registered to vote, and most headed to the polls in November 2016






PERCENT OF INDIVIDUALS REGISTERED TO VOTE

New Hampshire women dramatically outperformed the national voting average in 2016, but Maine topped New Hampshire by 5 percentage points.
