Our research has shown that New Hampshire was not immune to the national trends: women, especially women of color, were more vulnerable to COVID-19—related health and economic effects because of persistent gender and racial inequalities in our systems. During the pandemic, women left the workforce at astounding rates due to a lack of childcare or support systems. Returning to the pre-pandemic "normal" where women had to choose between their families and their work outside the house should not be an option. We must build back differently.

The needs of New Hampshire women, especially working mothers and women of color, demand greater attention and greater investment, and the Women's Foundation is committed to being part of this work. And after a devastating legislative session for reproductive rights in the Granite State, the Foundation is steadfast in our commitment to fight for full access to reproductive health care for all Granite Staters who need it.

We are looking forward to seeing you this fall. In addition to the return of our in-person Women Building Community Luncheon on October 21st, we'll be hitting the road and traveling to communities across the state to reconnect with friends and introduce our new Strategic Plan. Developed by our Board of Directors in the midst of COVID, this framework will guide us as we maximize the Foundation's investment and reach over the next ten years, shaping a more equitable future for New Hampshire women and girls.

Over the past few months, we were thrilled to welcome six distinguished women to our board: Palana Belken, Maggie Goodlander, Melanie Levesque, Carmen Lorentz, Sheila McNeil and Connie Roy-Czyzowski. These women bring experience and leadership skills from varying industries and will serve as assets to empower the women and girls of New Hampshire. We're honored to work along-side these women to continue our important mission.



Palana Belken is an activist, organizer, and a Rochester city counselor. She is the first openly transgender person to ever get elected to a city council in the state of New Hampshire, and has spent the past two years as the Trans Justice Organizer for the ACLU of New Hampshire, where she worked as a community organizer and advocate.



Maggie Goodlander is a lawyer and teaches constitutional law and administrative law at UNH School of Law. She has spent much of the past decade working in legal and policy positions in each branch of the United States government and in both houses of Congress. She is also a lieutenant in the U.S. Navy Reserve and serves on the board of directors of New Hampshire Legal Assistance and the World Affairs Council of NH.



Melanie Levesque is president of communications and consulting company TCS of America Enterprises. Levesque served in the State Senate (2018-2020) and is a former New Hampshire representative for Hollis, Brookline and Mason. In her community she has served as a Trustee for the New Hampshire Community College System, and Advisory Committee Member for New Hampshire Endowment for Health, among others.



Carmen Lorentz currently serves as the Executive Director of Lakes Region Community Developers (LRCD), developing healthy homes, creating vibrant community assets and engaging residents. Prior to joining LRCD, Carmen was the Director of the Division of Economic Development at the NH Department of Resources and Economic Development.

Honoring the past, while looking towards the future.

In early 2020, Bob Thoresen made a generous gift of \$75,000 (\$25,000 for three years) to the Women's Foundation in honor of his wife Sue's 75th birthday and her long-term commitment to the NH Women's Foundation. Sue was a Founder of the Women's Fund, a NHWF predecessor organization, and served as the organization's Treasurer for 7 years, as well as the Executive Committee, Finance Committee, Merger Task Force and Bylaws Committee.

She is the most nurturing and selfless person I have ever met," Bob noted. "Sue devotes herself to every task she agrees to take on with a low-key, forthright, and no-nonsense manner. She does her homework, is superbly prepared, and delivers—always with grace and humility. The Women's Fund—now the Women's Foundation—has been a beneficiary of Sue's time, treasure and talent for more than 20 years and I wanted to honor her commitment to the Foundation with this gift for her birthday.

While both Sue and Bob have been longtime donors to and champions for growing the Foundation's endowment to a minimum of \$4,000,000, Bob's 2020 gift had two different purposes: 1) to increase NHWF's "supplemental grantmaking" in recognition of the serious short term needs due to the COVID-19 pandemic and 2) to develop a ten-year financial stability and growth plan that would increase the Foundation's philanthropy to build the Endowment and sustainability of the Foundation in multiple ways. "We are so grateful for and inspired by Bob and Sue's commitment to the Foundation. Their investment in our grantmaking program came at a critical momentjust as the COVID-19 pandemic was exploding," said Tanna Clews, CEO. "Thanks to their gift we could increase our COVID-19 Rapid Response grantmaking and get more dollars to organizations who were facing the immediate prospect of layoffs and potential closure."

The Thoresen's meaningful impact on the Foundation continues as Sue helps the Foundation staff explore and expand its suite of philanthropic offerings such as donor advised, field of interest, and memorial funds. Sue and Bob's versatility as donors, their willingness to adapt, and to recognize the short and long-term needs of the Foundation is immeasurable. They continue to honor the past, but never take their eyes off the future.



Reproductive Rights on the Chopping Block

This past year, in the midst of a public health crisis where women are bearing the overwhelming majority of negative health and economic impacts — while still shouldering most caregiving responsibilities for family members — some New Hampshire legislators chose to focus on attacking our reproductive health care and restricting access to abortion.

Six anti-choice bills were introduced this session that impose restrictions on abortion and/or cut family planning funding: HB 625, HB 622, HB 430, HB 434, HB 596 and HB 233. The Women's Foundation joined reproductive justice allies in calling for these six bills to be defeated, stating: "Now is the time when we must call on our policymakers to reject these attacks on reproductive health care, and to provide criticallyneeded support for New Hampshire women and families."

HB 625 and HB 233 made their way out of committee and were passed by the House, but were narrowly defeated in the Senate as standalone bills. Most alarming and consequential, however,

was language from HB 625 added by Senate Republicans into HB2, one of two bills that made up the FY 2021–2022 New Hampshire state budget.

The provision added to the HB2, known as the "Fetal Life Protection Act" includes a ban on all abortions after 24 weeks, except in the narrowly defined single exception for "the physical health of the mother" — no exceptions for rape, incest or fatal fetal anomalies. In addition doctors and medical providers would face criminal penalties of up to seven years in prison and fines of up to \$100,000. Finally, the restrictions in HB2 also mandate a medically unnecessary ultrasound prior to abortion at ANY stage of pregnancy.

On the morning of the budget vote, CEO Tanna Clews issued a statement, including the following: "The New Hampshire Women's Foundation supports full access to reproductive health care for all who need it, and we oppose HB2, the proposed New Hampshire budget for FY 21-22. We believe that women and people who can become pregnant should have freedom to make reproductive and sexual health choices AND have access to the necessary health care to fulfill those choices, including birth control, abortion, maternity care and genderaffirming health care. An attack on any woman's health care is an attack on all of us.

HB2 passed the legislature on Thursday, June 24th and was signed into law the following day by Governor Sununu, making him the first governor in New Hampshire history to sign an abortion ban into law. Starting in January 2022, pregnant people will now be required to have an ultrasound before getting an abortion at any stage of gestation. And doctors providing care to families at their most difficult time will weigh felony charges against the best treatment for their patients.

The Women's Foundation remains committed to the fight for reproductive health care, access and justice, and are hopeful that these harmful restrictions will be repealed.

Pathways to Prosperity Awarded to Early Learning NH

The Pathways to Prosperity grant is given annually to an organization which works to boost the economic security of women in New Hampshire, and this year was the first time the \$10,000 award has gone to support advocacy efforts. Early Learning New Hampshire is a statewide nonprofit committed to ensuring all New Hampshire children have the opportunity to reach their full potential. The organization focuses its advocacy efforts on child care, including programs and centers, child care professionals who make up the workforce, and the families they serve. Since 2003, Early Learning NH has supported advocacy that champions effective early learning policy that expand or preserve over \$65 million dollars in state and federal funding for New Hampshire's children and families.

"It is the commitment of advocates like Early Learning New Hampshire that have protected our child care infrastructure for years, but especially through the COVID-19 pandemic. We are honoring that vital commitment with this unprecedented use of our Pathways to Prosperity award," said New Hampshire Women's Foundation CEO Tanna Clews. "Congratulations, Early Learning New Hampshire!"



Gender Matters

Women Elected in NH Towns and Cities


New Hampshire has historically done well when it comes to electing women to our highest offices. We were home to both the first and second women ever to be elected both Governor and Senator (Shaheen and Hassan), and have sent two back-to-back all-women federal delegations to Washington DC. However, on the municipal level, data has not been historically collected. So starting last year, we worked closely with town and city clerks across the state to pull what we believe is the first look at gender data for local elected officials. We saw a lack of parity on the municipal level, especially in executive positions. The numbers show much area for improvement — and we hope this snapshot will be helpful in informing voters and candidates of the opportunity for better gender representation in their towns.


COVID-19 and Its Effect on NH Women

The COVID-19 pandemic hit New Hampshire women harder than men on a variety of fronts — and women of color were impacted at higher rates, too. Our special December issue of Gender Matters broke down the numbers. New Hampshire women were more likely to work in industries that were hit hardest, and were more likely to be on the front lines, exposed to the virus. New Hampshire unemployment data also showed that the vast majority of unemployment claims citing child care as a reason for unemployment were filed by women. Early on, women also had higher rates of COVID-19 positive cases and deaths, but those numbers did not persist long-term. As we look at re-opening and building back differently, we will continue to keep an eye on the gender disparities both exposed and exacerbated by COVID-19.
