



2019: ISSUE 1 Women and the 2018 General Election Results

Women made significant political gains in 2018 - the "Year of the Woman 2.0." Across the country, women smashed records: the number who filed to run, the number who became their party's nominee, and the number who were elected to federal, state and local office. Ultimately, women's historic political engagement resulted in greater gender diversity at the state and local level and moved us closer to gender parity. While the numbers are illustrative, they don't tell the full story.

IN NEW HAMPSHIRE, WOMEN GAINED SEATS IN BOTH CHAMBERS

In 2018, New Hampshire women gained seats in both the State Senate and the State House. The number of women in the Senate increased from 7 to 10 out of a total of 24 members and in the House from 115 to 135 out of a total of 400 members.




FEMALE CANDIDATES BROKE THE MOLD WITH NEW CAMPAIGN TACTICS AND PERSONAL NARRATIVES

In the 2018 cycle, women's lived experiences dominated their campaign narratives. Candidates breastfed and confronted domestic abuse in campaign ads. Female veterans sought to "redeploy" their skills "on a new mission." And, in a breakthrough for candidates with young children, a Congressional candidate won approval from the Federal Election Commission to use campaign funds for child-care expenses. In these ways and more, female candidates put gender and family in the forefront of their campaigns and the electorate responded favorably. Nearly 80% of voters said it was very important or somewhat important to see more women elected to public office.³

TO REACH GENDER PARITY, WE MUST **ELEVATE WOMEN ON BOTH SIDES OF** THE AISLE TO RUN FOR OFFICE

Despite this year's gains for women in the NH Legislature, there is an increasing disparity in the number of women elected between the two major parties. A record number of Democratic women are serving in the NH House in 2019, but the number of Republican women is the lowest in three decades. Future efforts to educate, empower and train women to run for state and local office must proceed with this in mind.
